I joined the Central Team in September, previously I had been Deputy Headteacher at Tadcaster Grammar School for the last seventeen years. It has been particularly lovely in the last few weeks, to hear so much music happening around the school. Our KS2 classes have all enjoyed discovering the new instruments they will be learning how to play this year, and they are looking forward to sharing what they have learnt so far when they perform at our musical

Pupils meet HM King Charles III

We were very excited this term when two of the pupils at Monk Fryston met the King. Their classes had entered a competition run by York Minster to design a stone carving representing their hopes and dreams for the next 70 years, linked to the Platinum Jubilee of HM Elizabeth II. Their designs were then carved into stone by the masons at the Minster, and were unveiled at a ceremony attended by HM King Charles III and the Queen Consort when they visited York in November. The pupils and their parents, accompanied by their teacher, were introduced to the royal party and asked to explain their designs. They also featured on BBC Look North that evening. We were very proud of them!



Following recent Ofsted inspections at both schools, Saxton received a SIAMS (Church of England) inspection in November. This looked at the effectiveness of the school as a Church school. We were delighted that the inspector judged the school to be 'Good' and wrote a report that highlighted the family feeling and strong relationships that exist: "Genuine care and kindness permeate the actions of all members of the school community Saxton is a happy, nurturing school, proudly committed to its local area." This reflects the school that we know and love and we are very proud of this achievement.

The community events that both schools organised this term have been lovely family occasions and have raised a great deal of funds for our schools. In particular, our Christmas Fairs have been brilliant and a great way to start the festive season. Saxton Church held the Christmas Tree Festival with contributions from the school, and stalls including the ever-popular chocolate tombola and raffle. Monk Fryston fair saw Santa visit and had an array for craft stalls from local providers. Both were well attended and brought the whole community together. We are very grateful to everyone who volunteered, helped and attended them.

Students have earned an international accreditation recognising their amazing work in making their school more environmentally friendly and raising eco-awareness with fellow students. Eco-Schools is an international education programme that prompts young people to explore sustainability and climate change and take action. Activities included taking part in the Big School Clean Up, growing fruit and vegetables in the school greenhouse/vegetable patch and monitoring the wildlife using bird feeders.
